The moon's pull is stronger than the sun because, even though the sun is larger, the moon is closer to the earth. As the moon gets full or waxes, its gravitational pull on the earth gets stronger. And it is felt the most when the moon is full (the moon and sun pull from the opposite sides of the earth at this time).

Gardening by the Moon

The start of the waxing phase with the new moon is the best time to sow and plant above ground leafy vegetables. Plants that respond well during this quarter include broccoli, cabbage, lettuce, spinach, celery and cauliflower. The water table is rising and the plants will take up nutrients and germinate quickly.

Gardening by the Moon. How to follow a lunar planting guide

Moon phase gardening takes into account two periods of the lunar cycle: the time between the new Moon and the full Moon (the waxing of the Moon), and the time between the full Moon and the new Moon (the waning of the Moon). It's considered best to plant certain types of plants during the waning of the Moon and other types during the waxing.

Gardening by the Moon: How to Plant by the Moon's Phase ...

During the Full Moon stage the light starts to decrease and the sap in the plants starts to flow downwards. It's the best time to sow and plant all root vegetables as this is a period of good root growth. During the Last Quarter there is both decreased light and decreased gravitational pull. This is a time for rest.

Gardening by The Moon - Organic Edible Garden

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It is generally a good time for planting, especially two days before the full moon. The types of crops that prefer the second quarter are annuals that produce above ground, but their seeds form inside the fruit, such as beans, melons, peas, peppers, squash, and tomatoes. Plant just before the full moon to get the benefits of peak moisture.

Gardening During The Full Moon The Full Moon is the best time to sow root vegetables and perennials. This quarter is a period of strong root growth as energy draws down into the earth. Plant root vegetables like potatoes, onions, and carrots, as well as perennials like fruit trees, rhubarb, asparagus, and bulbs during the Full Moon.

For example, moon-based planting calendars suggest sowing seeds for crops that yield an aboveground harvest when the moon is increasing (going from new moon to full moon). Root crops, on the other hand, are best planted during the waning moon (going from full moon to new moon).

Root out, grub up weeds, clear the woodside, hedge (during the waxing moon). Pile a manure or compost. (during the waxing moon). Grapple with underground pests. Enrich and water flowers with poor root assemblage. Make prickling-out sprout. Prun the branches and graft orchards. Transplanting is favorable. Harvest is binned well. High-quality seeds.

Gardening During Waxing or Waning Moons From the new moon to the full moon, or during the increasing or waxing moonlight, it is good to plant annuals which produce their yield above the ground. Annuals are plants that complete their entire life cycle in one growing season, and must be reseeded again in the next year.

Waxing Moon: The moon is growing and the pull is upwards. Week 1: (New Moon) At the New Moon, the lunar gravity pulls the water up (seeds swell and burst.) Increasing moonlight balances root and leaf growth. This time is favourable for planting above ground leafy crops, that produce their seeds outside the fruit: lettuce; basil; spinach; celery

Below-Ground (Root) Crops. Root crops do best when the Moon is waning. When the Moon is just past Full, it's a good time to sow or plant root crops and fruit trees like apples, potatoes, beets, turnips, asparagus, and rhubarb. During the Last Quarter phase, it's best to avoid planting at all.
